Locality Plan Erf 2630 - Pearly Beach

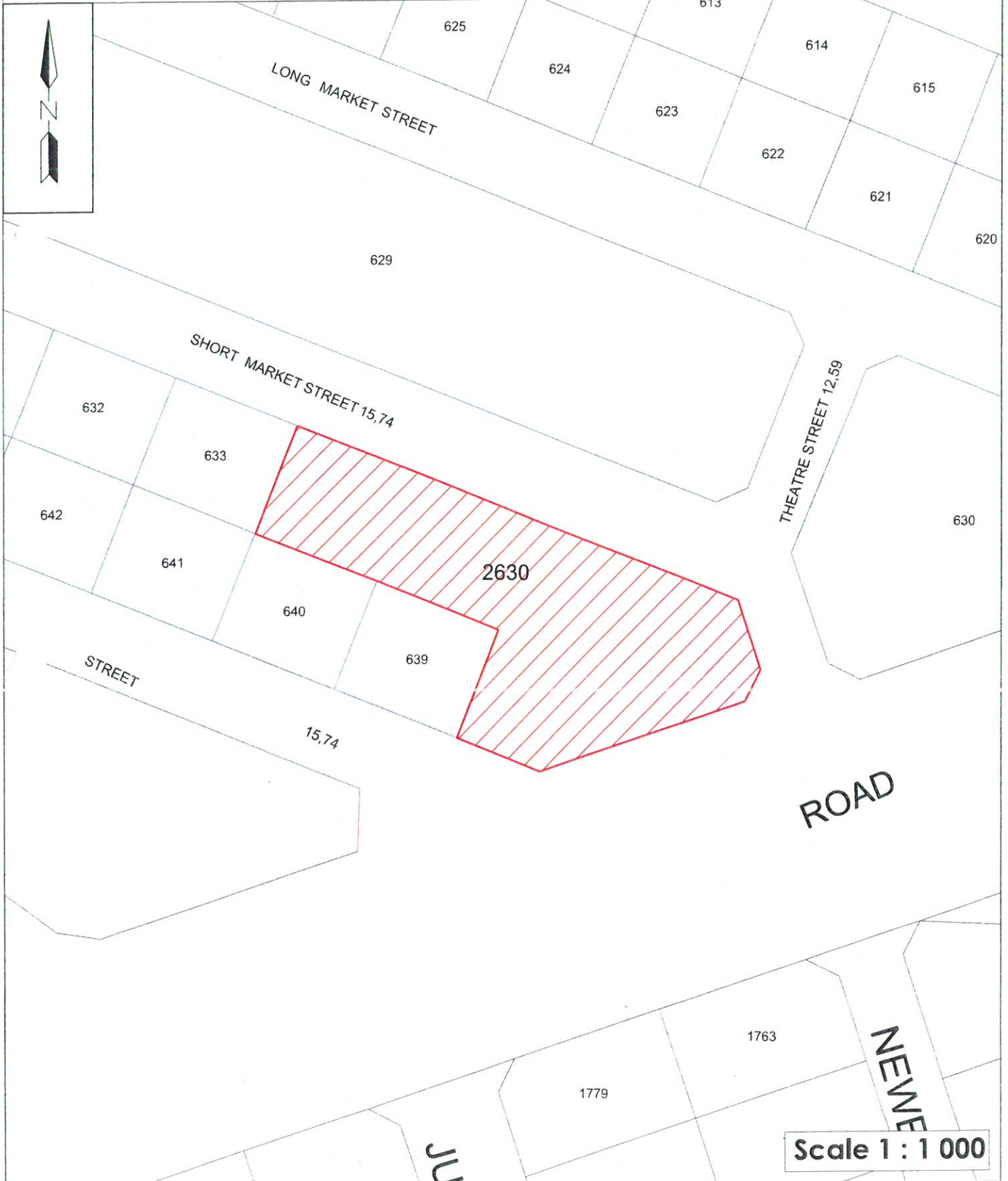

3. BACKGROUND AND INTENT

Erf 2630 Pearly Beach, hereafter referred to as the subject property (Refer to **Plan 1** for the locality), is owned by Mr Leslie Neil Cilliers, hereafter referred to as the applicant.

The applicant has owned Erf 2630 Pearly Beach, since 2018. The subject property has an existing building being utilised as shops, and a restaurant. The applicant has the vision to expand on his land uses to be able to utilise the property to its maximum potential and in the process create a unique experience in the Pearly Beach area.

The applicant wants to operate a car wash on the subject property, which will be a unique, new business in Pearly Beach. In addition to the car wash, the applicant wants to establish a market, which will be operated as a farmers' market where formal structures will be erected and rented out to local entrepreneurs that wish to sell homemade products and craft.

The market will attract tourists and local people when the market is in operation, and it will produce economic activity for the entire Pearly Beach area. There will be numerous advantages to provide additional tourist establishments in Pearly Beach.

To ensure the applicant's vision is achieved, approval of the following applications is required:

- Removal of restrictive title deed conditions;
- Consent use for a service station (car wash);
- Consent use to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages; and
- Departure to allow a 'market' on the subject property.

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4. PROCEDURE TO ACHIEVE THE APPLICANT'S INTENT

WRAP compiled this report to ensure the applicant's vision is achieved. The following is proposed:

4.1 Removal of restrictive title deed conditions in terms of Section 16(2)(f) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended.

There are three restrictive title deed conditions that prohibit the land use rights sought by the applicant as described in Section 3 and the rationale for the removal of these conditions are discussed below:

Restrictive Title Deed Conditions
Condition 2(C)(4)(b) – <i>“it shall be used for shop purposes only;”</i>
Condition 2(C)(4)(d) – <i>“No building or structure or any portion thereof, except boundary walls and fences, verandahs and balconies, shall be erected nearer than 2,36 metres to the street line which forms a boundary of this erf.”</i>
Condition 4(4.3) – <i>“SUBJECT to the terms of Endorsement dated 22 April 1955 on Deed of Transfer No. T18934/1952, reading as follows</i> <i>“By Notarial Deed No. 184/55 dated 19 November 1954 the following conditions created over the within property in favour of Erf 332, Pearly Beach Township, measuring 1,3423 (one comma three four two three) hectares. held by Deed of Transfer No. 11090/1954, viz:</i> <i>“That henceforth until the expiration of a period of ten years reckoned from the date upon which a liquor licence shall have been granted in respect of the said Dominant Property, no Hotel, Club, Bottle Store, Bar or other place or places for the sale or dealing in or beers, malt liquors, wines, spirits and intoxicating liquors of any kind whatsoever and whether such sale or dealing in be by retail or wholesale shall be carried out on the Servient Property.”</i> <i>As will more fully appear on reference to the said Notarial Deed, a copy of which is annexed hereto.”</i>

The rationale for the removal of the restrictive title deed conditions is to enable the applicant to achieve the development intent highlighted in Section 3. The title deed conditions are more restrictive than what is allowed in terms of the OMLUS. The applicant is currently not adhering to the title deed conditions above and necessitates the removal of any restrictive conditions.

The rationale for the removal of these restrictive title deed conditions will be discussed in detail in Section 7 of this report.

4.2 Departure from the Overstrand Municipality Land Use Scheme, 2020 to allow a 'Market' on Erf 2630 Pearly Beach in terms of Section 16(2)(b) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended.



MOTIVATION

The applicant has the vision to introduce a new tourist attraction to Pearly Beach and to establish a market on the subject property. The subject property has a B3 zoning which does not make provision for a market as a primary- or consent use, a departure from the OMLUS to allow the market to be established is therefore required. The outdoor market experience that is being applied for is not out of the ordinary for the Overstrand area and is established in most other towns within the Municipality.

According to the OMLUS, a market is defined as the following: "**market**" means an outdoor venue for the sale of fresh produce, food and beverages, crafts, art and manufactured goods to the public;"

The applicant's intent falls in line with the definition of a market, but also wish to expand on this definition to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages. The definition will then read as follows:

"market" means an outdoor venue for the sale of fresh produce, food, beverages, and alcoholic beverages, crafts, art and manufactured goods to the public;"

The market will consist of 6 (six) formal structures 6m x 4m (24m² each) that will be available to local entrepreneurs and crafters to rent and be utilised to serve food and drinks to the public. This will attract tourists and local patrons of the surrounding area. This is a unique land use for the area and Pearly Beach will greatly benefit from this attraction.

The 6 (six) structures will be constructed of the highest quality materials ensuring the product that is created remains of the utmost quality. The market will adhere to the development parameters of the B3 zoning and building plans will be submitted to the Overstrand Municipality's Building Control Department for approval before construction. Refer to **Plan 4** for the SDP.

4.3 Consent use to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages in terms of Section 16(2)(o) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended.

The definition for the 'sale of alcoholic beverages' in terms of the OMLUS is as follows: "*sale of alcoholic beverages*" means the sale or offering for sale of drinks capable of producing intoxication in a consumer and may include bars, pubs and taverns;"

The applicant envisions the market selling alcoholic beverages as mentioned above. The market will attract tourists and local patrons to enjoy locally made food and produce and enjoy beverages to be consumed on site, which may include alcoholic beverages.

All necessary liquor licenses will be obtained from the Western Cape Liquor Authority.

4.4 Consent use to allow a service station in terms of Section 16(2)(o) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended.

The definition of a service station in terms of the OMLUS is as follows: "*service station*" means a property for the retail supply of fuel and includes trading in motor vehicles, oil, tyres and motor spares, general motor repairs to vehicles, exhaust fitment, **washing of vehicles**, and a shop of which the floor area does not exceed 50% of the total floor space of all buildings on the land unit but does not include spray painting, panel beating, black smithery or body work.

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The definition of a car wash in terms of the OMLUS is as follows: "car wash" means any structure or structures where vehicles are washed and/or valeted;"

Pearly Beach currently does not have a formal car wash and the applicant envisions filling the gap in the market. A car wash is allowed in terms of the OMLUS under the consent use of a "service station". Although it is noted that a service station unlocks various other land uses, the applicant is only requiring the land use of a car wash and if required it can be made a condition of approval.

The operation of the car wash will create employment opportunities that will be filled by residents of the Pearly Beach area. The water used will be recycled, cleaned and stored on-site for reuse either for the washing of cars or for irrigation purposes on the entire property. The water will be stored in two 5000l water tanks placed next to the car wash. If not required on the property, the cleaned and filtered wastewater it will be discarded into the OM's sewage network and not into the stormwater system. Refer to **Plan 4** for the SDP.

5. APPLICATION

Considering the above, application is made for the following:

- 5.1 Removal of restrictive title deed conditions** in terms of Section 16(2)(f) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended;
- 5.2 Departure** from the Overstrand Municipality Land Use Scheme, 2020 to allow a 'market' on Erf 2630 Pearly Beach in terms of Section 16(2)(b) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended;
- 5.3 Consent use to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages** in terms of Section 16(2)(o) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended; and
- 5.4 Consent use to allow a service station (car wash)** in terms of Section 16(2)(o) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended.

6. LAND USE ENVIRONMENT

The subject property is located in the business node of Pearly Beach and the surrounding area has residential and authority zonings. The surrounding area's zonings are illustrated in **Plan 2** (zoning plan). All adjacent properties are zoned for business purposes. These properties are either vacant or being operated as a pub.

With the South African housing market changing, COVID has created a wave of South Africans that are 'semigrating' to the Western Cape. Semigrating is a term being used more and more and it means - movement from one part of a country to another (as opposed to emigration, which is migration to another country).

These new inhabitants are moving to coastal areas which in turn will require more businesses and more job opportunities, both of which are being proposed with the land use application.



MOTIVATION

The area where the subject property is located is in Pearly Beach's business node (N1 as per the MSDP). Refer to **Plan 8** for the surrounding area's land use plan:

Erf 639 – Is being operated as the pub and grill.

Erf 631 – Is being operated as a business with residential above ground floor.

Erven 601 and 602 are being operated as business enterprises.

There are various other business opportunities within the area as there are numerous vacant erven that are zoned business that may be developed.

7. TITLE DEED

The title deed of the subject property was perused (T49822/2018, refer **Annexure B**) and it contains the following restrictive conditions:

Title deed restrictions

Condition 2(C)(4)(b) – “it shall be used for shop purposes only;”

Condition 2(C)(4)(d) – “No building or structure or any portion thereof, except boundary walls and fences, verandahs and balconies, shall be erected nearer than 2,36 metres to the street line which forms a boundary of this erf.”

Motivation

The rationale for the proposed removal

The proposed and current land uses on Erf 2630 Pearly Beach, are currently being restricted by these two title deed conditions. The current land uses are in contravention with the title deed conditions as the subject property has a restaurant which is not aligned with the title deed conditions. A market and car wash are also not aligned with the conditions within the title deed.

The applicant envisions exercising primary- and consent uses within the development parameters set out by the OMLUS for a B3 zoning. Currently, the title deed conditions are more restrictive than the OMLUS and the applicant wants to utilise his property to the maximum and is currently being restricted.

Title deed condition background

The insertion of these restrictive title deed conditions occurred in 1934 when the most prominent commercial enterprises were shops that had an exclusively local customer base. Any amendment or removal of this condition requires the consent of the Administrator. This authority now vests with the Overstrand Municipality.

Status quo

The current OMLUS has clear development guidelines in place to ensure the whole of the Overstrand Area's business properties is managed in a similar manner. The title deed conditions are more restrictive than the OMLUS and the applicant has a vision and plans to expand beyond these conditions.

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Title deed restrictions

Condition 4(4.3) – “SUBJECT to the terms of Endorsement dated 22 April 1955 on Deed of Transfer No. T18934/1952, reading as follows

"By Notarial Deed No. 184/55 dated 19 November 1954 the following conditions created over the within property in favour of Erf 332, Pearly Beach Township, measuring 1,3423 (one comma three four two three) hectares. held by Deed of Transfer No. 11090/1954, viz:

"That henceforth until the expiration of a period of ten years reckoned from the date upon which a liquor licence shall have been granted in respect of the said Dominant Property, no Hotel, Club, Bottle Store, Bar or other place or places for the sale or dealing in or beers, malt liquors, wines, spirits and intoxicating liquors of any kind whatsoever and whether such sale or dealing in be by retail or wholesale shall be carried out on the Servient Property."

As will more fully appear on reference to the said Notarial Deed, a copy of which is annexed hereto."

Motivation

The rationale for the proposed removal

Although the subject property has a valid liquor licence, the title deed conditions are currently not being adhered to. The owners of Erf 332 Pearly Beach in whose favour this condition is registered, have not yet developed Erf 322 Pearly Beach. The restrictive title deed condition is limiting the uses that are allowed on the subject property.

The applicant's vision and intent are being limited and restricted by a condition that was inserted in the mid-1950's and has never been acted upon.

Title deed condition background

The restrictive title deed condition was originally intended to limit the number of liquor licences within the Pearly Beach area and allow Erf 322 Pearly Beach to operate uncontested for 10 years. With the condition originally inserted into the title deed in 1954 the 10 years allowed in terms of the condition should have lapsed in 1964 but was not acted upon which creates an unfair monopoly.

Status quo

Considering the above, the subject property has a valid liquor licence and when the application for removal of the restrictive condition is advertised, the owners of Erf 322 Pearly Beach will be afforded the opportunity to participate in the public participation process.

The land uses on the subject property is currently not aligned with the restrictive conditions in the title deed and is the rationale for the removal of the restrictive title deed conditions.



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In terms of the requirements of LUPA, the following information is addressed in terms of Section 39(5)(a-f):

9. SERVICES

The availability of services is a relevant consideration in terms of Section 42(1)(c)(v) of SPLUMA and is herewith illustrated.

Electricity, Water, Sewage and Solid Waste

The subject property is connected to the OM's networks, these include electricity, water and sewage. The proposal of this application will not have a negative impact of the area.

Solid waste is collected every week by the OM. Grey water will be used on site to irrigate and any additional will be discarded in a proper manner.

Access and Egress

Main Road and Short street are the access and egress points to the subject property and the proposal will not affect this.

10. NEED AND DESIRABILITY

The need and desirability of the approval and implementation of this proposal in accordance with Section 66 (1) (c) of the OM By-Law can be illustrated as follow:

Need and desirability

The need for the land use application is to allow the applicant to utilise his property to its maximum capabilities and meets all the needs of the applicant. The desirability is more often a personal feeling of the applicants. The applicant envisions aiding the economic growth in Pearly Beach by introducing businesses and experiences not yet available in the Pearly Beach area.

To be able to operate these businesses the applicant requires a workforce, and these employees will be from the local population, creating stable economic activities contributing to the financial sector of the Pearly Beach area.

To achieve their vision, the applicant has appointed WRAP Project Office to submit this application to ensure the proposed development is not in contradiction to any policies, legislation, or title deed conditions.

Impact on views, sunlight and character of the area

The subject property is located in a business node with several other uses in the area, refer to **Plan 2**. It is not proposed that the new land uses, or existing land uses will have any more of an impact than what is currently being experienced. The land uses sought by the applicant are in line with the character of the area.

The new businesses will comply with the OMLUS's development parameters ensuring no views, sunlight, or the character of the area is affected.

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Economic impact

These activities on the subject property already have an economic impact on the Pearly Beach area. There are three existing businesses that are being operated and employing staff and empowering residents of the surrounding area.

Once the construction is completed, which in itself will employ workers, more staff will be required to operate these new enterprises (Car Wash & Market). The market will empower small to medium enterprises as they will be able to “rent” one of the six (6) proposed structures to operate from and provide a service or product to the patrons of the market. The car wash is filling a gap in the market. These businesses will create a sustainable source of employment that will be utilised by the people from the surrounding areas.

Opportunity cost

An opportunity cost in the context of land use planning refers to a development proposal that leads to the devaluation or foregoing of valued land use rights of interested and affected parties when an application is approved. The development will not affect the values of surrounding properties and it is predicted that development should be encouraged in the Pearly Beach area.

Impact on heritage

The subject property is not listed in the OM Heritage Register.

Environmental impact

The subject property is not located within an environmentally important area.

11. POLICIES AND REGULATIONS

11.1 Overstrand Municipality Environmental Protection Overlay Zone (EMOZ)

The subject property is not located within this zone.

11.2 Overstrand Municipality Heritage Protection Overlay Zone (HPOZ)

The subject property is not located within this zone.

11.3 Spatial Planning Policies

The consistency of this proposal with the applicable spatial development policies will herewith be illustrated. The spatial policies which are pertinent to the submitted proposal are the following:

PSDF

The PSDF is a product of a provincial inter-departmental and inter-governmental collaboration under the guidance of the inter-departmental steering committee in collaboration with the private sector, academia, and non-governmental organisations. This broad participatory process has created a shared spatial vision that is intended to inform spatial development patterns in urban and rural areas in the province.

Throughout the PSDF economic development is a widespread term used and focussed on. Economic development is an aspect that is important to ensure the Provincial economy has a large impact on the National economy. The continual growth of the



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Provincial economy means that economic activity should be stimulated in lower spheres of the government. This application to allow additional businesses in a business node of Pearly Beach will add value to the Pearly Beach area which in turn will have a positive impact on the Overstrand Municipality. The application relates to the development of economic activity which is in line with the PSDF.

The approval and implementation of this expansion proposal will therefore contribute to making tourists appreciate the scenic and cultural landscape which exists in Pearly Beach.

MSDF

The objective of the MSDF is to formulate strategic spatially based policy guidelines and proposals where the needs, changes and growth in the area can be managed to benefit the inhabitants and the environment in the Overstrand Municipality. The MSDF is guided by a set of objectives and the consistency of this proposal will be assessed with these core objectives.

The subject property is being utilised to its maximum potential, developing land already earmarked for businesses purposes. The subject property has already been developed and is already aligned with the infill development imperatives of the MSDF. The subject proposal only entails expanding on existing land uses.

Patrons and tourists visiting the subject property will be attracted to not only the subject property but by the whole of Pearly Beach. The MSDF emphasises the importance of developing Pearly Beach as a tourism village which will be aided by the proposed development.

12. PLANNING PRINCIPLES

Chapter 2 of SPLUMA contains 5 uncompromisable planning principles by which each development application must be guided. Policy proposals in SPLUMA which are pertinent to this proposal are recorded below:

Spatial justice

The subject expansion and additional land uses will offer employment opportunities to the historically marginalised. This will lead to the employees having an income which will contribute to promoting equity as the employees will be able to afford access to opportunities such as housing, services and facilities. The approval and implementation of this proposal will therefore contribute to addressing spatial development imbalances caused by apartheid planning and contribute to attaining a more spatially just urban landscape.

Spatial sustainability

The proposed development and properties are ideally located within a business node of Pearly Beach is a mixed-use environment area with other uses surrounding the subject property. The proposed development is intended to contribute to allowing a functional space economy in Pearly Beach. Utilising existing infrastructure and expanding thereon will ensure the businesses are able to cope with the expanding population growth.

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Efficiency

This proposal entails the optimal use of space as most of the property is proposed to be used for either parking or the proposed businesses and existing businesses. The engineering services on the premises will also cater to a greater number of people within the engineering services capacity limits.

Spatial resilience

This proposal is not in conflict with any spatial planning policies or other OM regulations which is a hallmark of resilience.

Good administration

The OM has a credible track record of good administration regarding the method of public participation which invites and accepts comments from the public to make an informed decision as well as complying with the prescribed time frames pertaining to the processing of applications.



13. EVALUATION

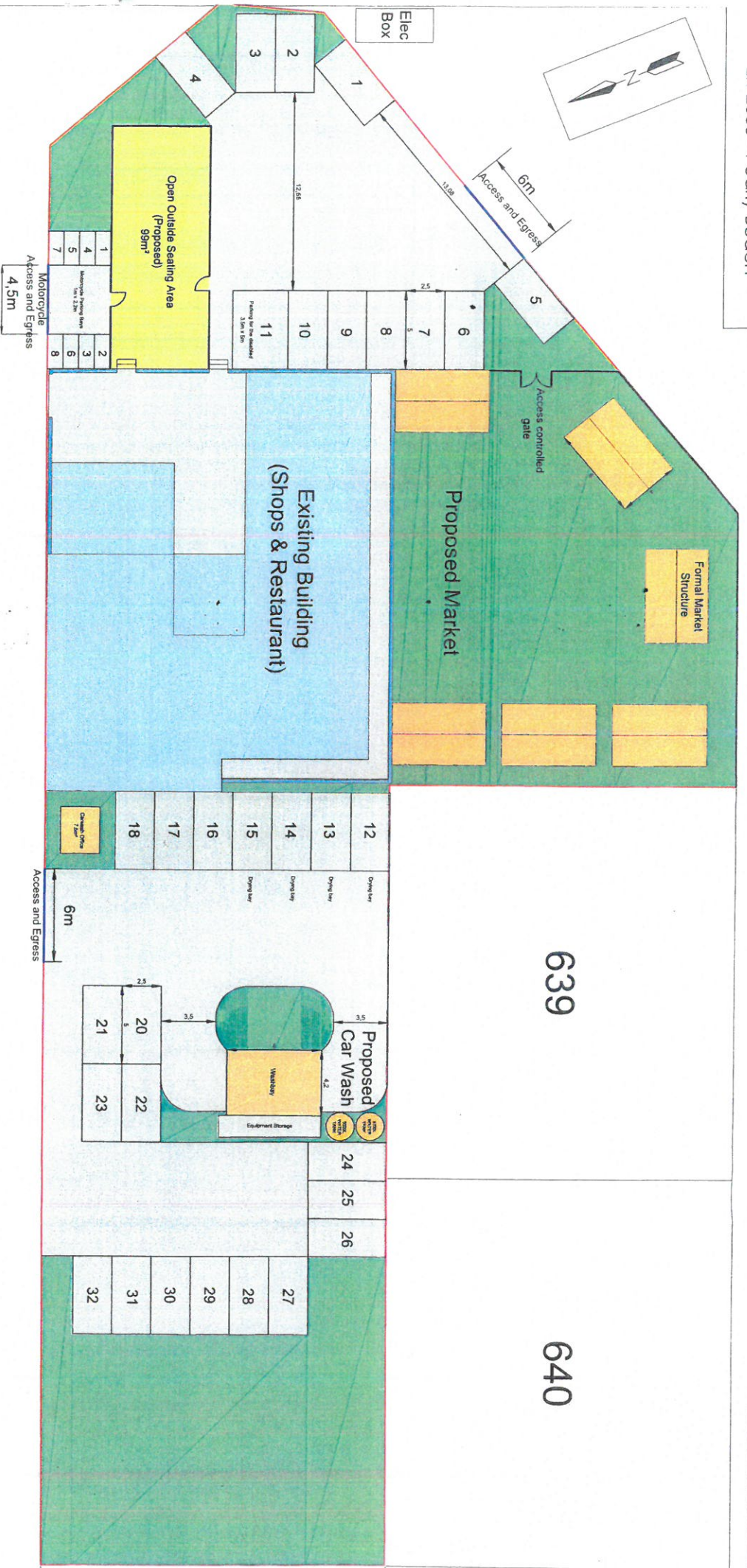
To achieve the vision of the applicant, a departure and consent use is being applied for. This will allow the operation of a market and a car wash once approved. The proposal is aligned with the policies and guidelines of the Overstrand Municipality. The restrictive title deed conditions are required to be removed as they are not being adhered to currently. The removal thereof will not take away from any other person's right only allow the applicant to continue with his intent for the property.

The departure of the OMLUS is done to unlock land uses that is not currently available within the Business Zone 3 zoning and it is not out of character for the area and will attract tourists and patrons. The proposal is in harmony with all relevant spatial planning policies which illustrates that the applicant did not arbitrarily invent this proposal but had due consideration for relevant spatial planning policies.

14. RECOMMENDATION

Based on the abovementioned motivation, it is recommended that the following be approved:

- 14.1 Removal of restrictive title deed conditions** in terms of Section 16(2)(f) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended;
- 14.2 Departure** from the Overstrand Municipality Land Use Scheme, 2020 to allow a 'Market' on Erf 2630 Pearly Beach in terms of Section 16(2)(b) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended;
- 14.3 Consent Use to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages** in terms of Section 16(2)(o) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended; and
- 14.4 Consent Use to allow a service station (car wash)** in terms of Section 16(2)(o) of the Overstrand Municipality By-Law on Municipal Land Use Planning, 2015 as amended.
